

1 Kings 19:1-9

Now Ahab told

Jezebel everything Elijah had done and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword.² So Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah to say, "May the gods deal with me, be it ever so severely, if by this time tomorrow I do not make your life like that of one of them." ³ Elijah was afraid and ran for his life. When he came to Beersheba in Judah, he left his servant there, ⁴ while he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness. He came to a broom bush, sat down under it and prayed that he might die. "I have had enough, LORD," he said. "Take my life; I am no better than my ancestors." ⁵ Then he lay down under the bush and fell asleep. All at once an angel touched him and said, "Get up and eat." ⁶ He looked around, and there by his head was some bread baked over hot coals, and a jar of water. He ate and drank and then lay down again. ⁷ The angel of the LORD came back a second time and touched him and said, "Get up and eat, for the journey is too much for you." ⁸ So he got up and ate and drank. Strengthened by that food, he traveled forty days and forty nights until he reached Horeb, the mountain of God. ⁹ There he went into a cave and spent the night.

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- 1. What has most impacted you from Elijah's story so far? Share why.
- 2. Read 1 Kings 19:1-9.
 - Is it surprising to see death threats and despair after the mountain top moment in 18:36-46? Share why or why not.
 - If God won a victory on the mountain, why do you think Elijah still faces opposition?
- 3. Elijah's human side is front and centre in verses 3-5b. As you reflect on these verses together, answer the following:
 - Have you experienced any of what Elijah experienced? Share what you have experienced and what that was like.
 - What makes you most afraid?
 - How do you normally respond when you experience fear and despair?
- 4. How does God respond to Elijah's fear and despair? What does this teach you about who God is and how he relates to us when we feel this way?
- 5. Hebrews 4:14-16 tells us that Jesus understands all we go through because he was just like us, yet without sin. As you consider that:
 - Why is it important that Jesus was fully God and fully human?
 - Is it helpful for you to know that Jesus understands, even sympathizes, with what you feel and experience? Share why or why not.
 - How might this change how you relate to him?
- 6. Read 2 Corinthians 12:7-10 and then discuss the statement: *Your humanity isn't a barrier to the presence and power of God.*
