Beth means 'house'

Psalm 119 was made to be memorized. It was written using a mnemonic device that aids in memorization...for readers of Hebrew. But this shows that the Psalmist intended for this lengthy lyric to be learned by heart. Psalm 119 is broken into 22 sections, each line in the section beginning with the next letter of the Hebrew alphabet. Charles Spurgeon said, "The Spirit of God here condescends to alliteration, and to alphabetical arrangement, in order to help the memories of readers." (B. Kandt)

This Study Guide focuses on the second section, verses 9-16, in the New Living Translation.

May you take delight in memorizing God's word, Doreen Buhler Psalm 119 calls us to enter into relationship with God and His Word. Meditate on the words describing how we should respond to God's word. Then commit this list to memory.

Many of these words also describe the effort it takes to memorize: trying hard, reciting aloud, studying and, not forgetting. ©
